Australias only carbide works, at Snug in Tasmania, was severely damaged by fire at the weekend. Six transformers each estimated to be worth forty thousands dollars were destroyed. Australian Commonwealth Carbide Company Ltd. said yearly production of fourteen thousand tons would be cut by sixty percent because of the fire.

SYDNEY:

The NSW TAB expects to end this Financial year with a record turnover of more than one hundred and ninety million dollars. This was announced by the General Manager of the TAB, Mr J.P. Robertson. Mr. Robertson also said TAB security offices would hold discussions this week with senior police officers as part of special measures planned to guard against armed holdups. He said the Agency was particularly concerned at an upsurge in armed holdups in Sydney in recent weeks.

SYDNEY:

Ambulancemen and police treated about four hundred young people during a pop concert at the Sydney showgrounds on Sunday. Three girls were taken to hospital but were later discharged. Throughout the five hour non-stop concert fainting and hysterical girls were carried out of the crush to the first aid room.

CANBERRA:

The Commonwealth A.C.U. Advisory Board has rejected a Russell Drysdale portrait of the P.M. reportedly because it was not good likeness. Mr Gorton himself chose Mr. Drysdale to paint the portrait which was to have been hung with the portraits of former P.M.'s in Kings Hall. Mr Drysdale is expected to receive some expenses and the painting back but will not receive a commission.

PERTH:

Attempts over the wee kend to pull the Formosan freighter Sea Beauty off the coral reef, eight hundred miles north of Perth, failed. The nine thousand ton ship ran aground off north west cape last Thursday. On Saturday, a lighthouse tender, the Cape Don tried to dislodge the ship but the tow lines parted.

SYDNEY:

Quantas has sold four of its remaining six early model Boeing 707 to an American airline at a substantial profit. Quantas General Manager, Captain R.J. Ritchie, said there was intense interest by several International Airlines in the remaining two aircraft. Capt. Ritchie said the Boeings sold, had been idle since being withdrawn from service late last year. He said all types of aircraft bought by Quantas since World War 11 had been sold by the Company at a capital profit and this contributed significantly to buying new equipment for the company.

SYDNEY:

Australia will spend 90 million dollars on new ships, six of which will be built in Australia for the Australian National Line. Three of the ships will be container vessels, and all of these will be built overseas. One of the new container ships would be used for expanding the trade between Australia and the east coast of North America, the chairman of the A.N.L. said.

MELBOURNE :

Counting of preferences in the Bendigo by-election is expected to start on Friday 13 th June. So far Australian Labor Party candidate Mr. David Kennedy is still 1687 votes short of absolute majority over his Liberal opponent, Mr Warren Cambridge, and the three candidates. Political commentators say it is certain he will receive sufficient preferences to win the seat.

MELBOURNE:

Seventeen people lost their lives in the Lara bushfires because of a breakdown in communications, the Geelong Coroner, Mr.C.J.Thompson, found on the 10th June. Eighteen people died in the fires on January 8th. Mr.Thompson found they had died from misadventure. He said dust from the fires had interfered with radio communications and this had caused a delay of at least an hour in putting into effect the Geelong disaster plan and the setting up of police road blocks to prevent people driving along the Geelong highway. Seventeen of the victims died on the highway and the eighteenth died in the town of Lara, which is 29 miles southwest of Melbourne.

SYDNEY :

Soaking rains continued along the NSW coast on Tuesday after Sydney's worst electrical storm for 15 years. Overnight in Sydney, falls of up to six inches flooded roads, disrupted power supplies and grounded aircraft. A Fokker Friendship was hit twice by lightning soon after takeoff from Sydney Kingsford Smith airport on Tuesday. Little damage was caused and the aircraft and its passengers returned safely to the airport.

SYDNEY :

The NSW Cabinet has decided to create more openings in Government employment for people with court records. The Premier, MR.Askin said, special consideration would be given to juveniles under 18 who applied for Government jobs.

CANBERRA:

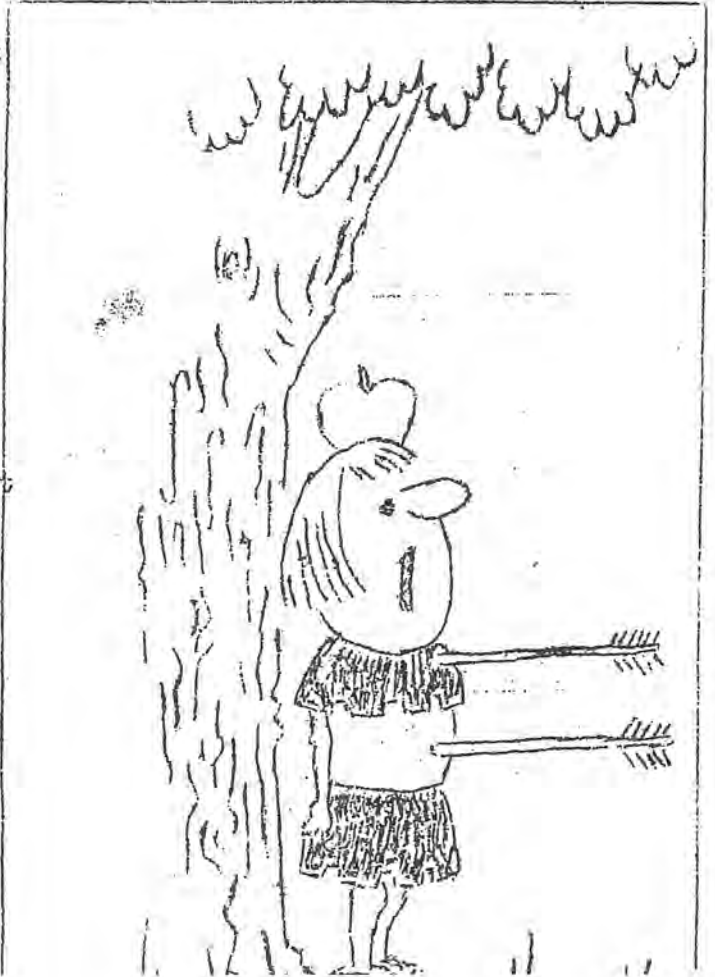
Bank accounts of publisher Maxwell Newton, were among documents police examined at Canberra Bank on Tuesday. The police check at the Bank of NSW was part of a Commonwealth Police Investigations into possible breaches of the Commonwealth Crimes Act. The summonses against Mr Pratt and the Bank check follow Commonwealth Police raid recently on Mr Newtons home and office.

BENEFITS FOR MEN WHO STAY LONGER IN THE ARMY. (From the Australian 31/5/69)

National Servicemen who voluntarily extend their full-time continuous service of two years in the army will be provided with a number of reestablishment benefits.

They must stay on for a period of between three months and two years to qualify.

They will then be eligible for vocational training on discharge, reestablishment loans and rehabilitation treatment and training.

The new deal for conscripts was announced last night by the Minister for National Service, Mr Bury.

He said post-discharge vocational training could be full-time or part-time from Technical Colleges, Agricultural Colleges, Universities or other private institutions.

All compulsory fees and examinations fees would be paid.

Financial assistance would be given towards the cost of fares, essential text-books, equipment and tools.

Loans of up to \$3000 would be available with a ceiling of \$6000 for agricultural purposes.

The money would be provided at 4-5% with the first \$100 interest free.
