The park here is up for sale and the owners have had plenty of offers but they won't sell to someone who won't do the right thing by the vets, how good is that, at present they are contributing to suicide in veterans especially the later ones, Afghanistan and Iraq, and it's good to see the Vietnam vets helping the younger ones.

If every veteran travelling north could call in and stay a night or so it would make a difference. I met some vets who have been living here for a few years and to sit and talk with them meant so much. It made me realize that there is still some vets doing it so tough. Cheers"

FROM BRIG GEORGE MANSFORD: The Changing of the Guard

The Australian Army Training Team Vietnam (AATTV) was formed in 1962 to serve in South Vietnam in an advisory role. Its members were all volunteers and comprised officers, warrant officers and non-commissioned officers.

The advisors were scattered over the width and breadth of the Nation from the DMZ to the Mekong Delta. They served in various units from the elite, highly trained and well equipped Special Forces to the ragtag and neglected Regional and Provincial Forces located throughout each Province

AATTV became a very prestigious and highly decorated unit including four Victoria Crosses. Casualties totalled 33 killed and 122 wounded

Unlike other units, at war's end, the unit was disbanded. The Team was no longer on the order of battle and there was no one to hand over the banners, so to speak. However, the strong unit spirit and camaraderie so evident in war never faltered in all the years that have followed, and continues to be strongly guarded by the elected committees that have and are serving within the AATTV Association.

Many years ago, the AATTV leadership bravely pursued the Team's dreams of a national home by constructing a memorial in the training grounds of the military base in Canungra, Queensland, where its members had been trained, selected and sent to Vietnam. Thus this "Very Special Place" became the home of AATTV.

The memorial, located at the edge of a vast training area is surrounded by native trees which were planted to represent each and every soldier of AATTV. It is in such peaceful surrounds where members and families travel from all parts of Australia to honour loved ones no longer with them.

Since the end of the Vietnam War there have been subsequent generations who have served overseas in similar roles. It seemed to many, that such younger veterans should become the custodians of the site. In simple soldiering terms, it would be a "Relief in Place" and subsequent generations of advisors would in turn be the new guards to honour the past including their own military service.

What is yet to be achieved is to obtain a guarantee from government that the sight will become sacrosanct and thus another milestone of military history to be seen and understood by generations yet to be born.

The final solution is currently being determined by very capable leadership within the AATTV association and one can only hope that the Team's final requests for the future of this "Special Place" will be approved by the Government of the Day. Until that time, the surviving members of the Team, until the very last man, will honour their motto "PERSEVERE"

Their wide canopies filtering gentle sun for seedlings not long born

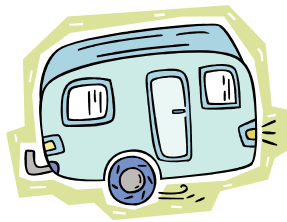
The old Guard will soon be gone from this very special place

I went to the local pet shop to buy a goldfish. The salesman asked if I wanted an aquarium. I told him I don't really care what star sign it is.

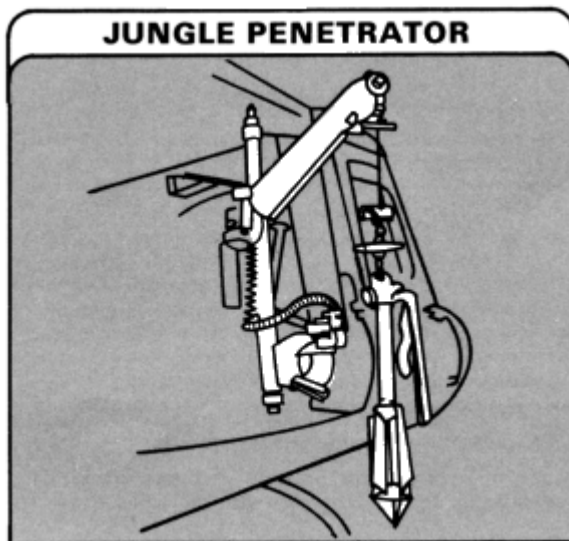

FROM THE LAST HALF CIRCLE (courtesy Roger Lambert):

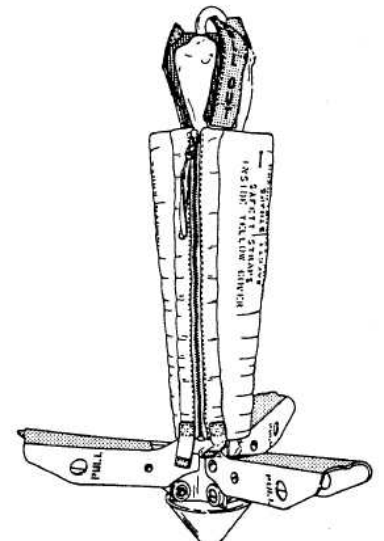
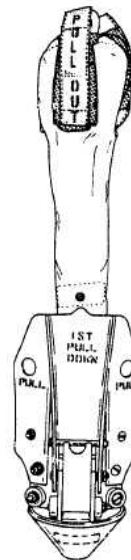
"What is this piece of equipment and what was it used for in Vietnam?" Hint - it was painted Olive Drab rather than the bright Yellow illustrated.
